Determined to serve

Kaminskas takes office after third attempt at Council

Cris Kaminskas has spent the last eightplus months pursuing a Liberty Lake City Council position.

Last spring, she lost a Council appointment to fill a vacated seat. In the fall, she lost a closely contested race to Josh Beckett for an open position.

Last week, her perseverance paid off.

The newest Council member recently answered some question for The Splash about her determination to serve, her hopes for her position and some tidbits about her life the community likely doesn't know.

You've had a long road to the City Council. What kept you motivated to continue pursuing a seat?

I knew that this was something I really wanted to do. When I lost in November, I decided to get involved with the community in a different way. I was going to volunteer for Friends of Pavillion Park but (when) Patrick resigned I decided to give it another try. I don't give up very easily. Like I said, everything happens for a reason.

Q: What was the most difficult part about your path to the City Council?

A: It was difficult for me to accept the fact that so many people just didn't care about or pay attention to either of the council races in the November election. I wish more people would pay attention and get involved.

Group appeals Lancaster rezoning

CAUSE objects to lakefront property change

A local citizen group has appealed a decision by the Spokane County Commissioners to rezone a hotly debated 3.6-acre lot on the north shore of Liberty Lake.

Earlier this month, CAUSE, an organization of local residents concerned with development in the Liberty Lake watershed, filed the appeal with the Eastern Washington Growth Management Hearings Board.

"What I marvel at (is) how many people were against it," Steve Shirley, CAUSE president and a Liberty Lake resident, said of the commissioners' rezone decision. "I feel they've thumbed their nose at all these people who have had input."

In December, the commissioners approved a change from rural traditional zoning to a low-density residential for the property, which has been owned for more than 50 years by Liberty Lake's Lancaster family.

The decision went against the recommendation of the county's planning commission and against vocal opposition by neighbors and others, who said they were concerned about the precedent set by the rezone and the environmental impact of such a development on the lake.

Commissioner Mark Richard said in December that the application was approved with the stipulation that a development agreement be reached between Spokane County and Lancaster Enterprises LLC, requiring the Lancasters to follow through

with their stated intention of separating the parcel into no more than five lots used specifically for single-family residences.

A low-density residential zone normally can include as many as six units per acre. Richard also said he would ask the family to consider limiting building height to one-story on the property.

Richard said in December that one reason the commissioners didn't come to the same conclusion as the planning commission was that the planners "kind of wrangled with issues that are really supposed to be wrangled with at the building permit phase." Capital facility concerns can be expressed once the application reaches that phase, he said last month.

Richard said he discussed the application with the county's legal counsel and determined that approval "met the test of the law" and thereby would not set a legal precedent. As far as a political precedent, Richard said the property is so unique it would be rare to find another that could be approved citing the same case commissioners used in this instance.

The CAUSE group, however, disagrees.

"It is opening the door. Land uses are established by precedent," Shirley said. "Four houses will not be the end of the lake; it's what if that happens at Sandy Beach?"

The Eastern Washington Growth Management Hearings Board is holding a prehearing conference with the involved parties early next month. From the day the appeal is filed, the board has six months to issue a decision, if the case runs its course, according to a board representative.

Richard and the Lancaster family could not be reached for comment regarding the appeal.

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






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Did you know? 10 facts about Liberty Lake

Did you know the county's garbage used to pile up near the hill at Country Vista Apartments?

That skiers once swished down the slopes on the hilltop now known at Legacy Ridge?

That developers planned to construct a regional mall on the Safeway site long before Spokane Valley built its shopping

Liberty Lake is a community rich with history and interesting factoids, and in honor of those times gone by, here is a list of 10 tidbits — some well-known and not-so-well-known — about Liberty Lake (which once was called Lake Grier).

Ironman Coeur d'Alene **▲** used to loop through Liberty Lake

Most residents likely will remember that the grueling Ironman race in neighboring Idaho once looped through Liberty Lake on the route to 2.4 miles of swimming, 112 miles of biking and 26.2 miles of running.

The bike course swept through the northeast corner of the community along Appleway Avenue and closed the roadways to other traffic.

In 2007, Ironman switched course to the north, rerouting the bike portion of the event to Hayden. Post Falls city officials had asked for reimbursement for extra city services used during the race, and some race participants said the course interest and variety could be improved.

The race director called the Hayden course better and safer.

Liberty Lake once was known as Lake Grier

U.S. Army Col. George Wright (more on him later) led battles against Native Americans living in the Liberty Lake area in the mid-1800s. After winning his bestknown battle in 1858, he named Lake Grier (what is now called Liberty Lake) in honor of Maj. William Nicholas Grier, who led battles elsewhere in the region.

The name didn't stick, however. Settlers who came to the area following the Civil War disregarded the military's designation. Liberty Lake is named after Stephen E. Liberty, who homesteaded in 1871 near the lake, along with other settlers. Liberty carried mail over the Mullan Trail in its early days and also served as a guide.

3. A regional shopping mall once was proposed for Liberty Lake

In the 1980s, Cafaro Co. out of Youngstown, Ohio, proposed a regional shopping mall for Liberty Lake. The proposed \$60 million project on more than 100 acres stalled, however, after a series of lawsuits mired it down in the spring of

Opponents of the project, which would have been located on the present Safeway site and Liberty Lake Commerce Center, said the developers needed to prepare an environmental impact statement.

When first proposed in 1986, the project was supposed to be 907,000 square feet and expected to provide more than 1,600 jobs, according to newspaper ar-

4 Col. George Wright slaughtered hundreds of horses near Liberty Lake

One of the most traumatic acts in the mid-1800s war between the U.S. government and Native Americans in the Inland Northwest occurred near Liberty Lake.

U.S. Army Col. George Wright, commanded to win decisively against the Native Americans, instructed his soldiers to slaughter about 800 horses belonging to the tribes of the area, according to historical accounts.

The animals were killed Sept. 8 and 9, 1858, along the banks of the Spokane River. Even 50 years later, the physical evidence was still there, with bleached bones of the horses spotted along the

Wright wrote of the act: "I deeply regretted killing those poor creatures, but a dire necessity drove me to it."

In 1946, an 8-foot granite marker was

installed along the river to commemorate the spot. It later was moved in 1964 about a mile east of the true location.

5 • A garbage dump operated near Liberty Lake's Country Vista Apartments

A 45-acre open-pit dump operated for decades in the hills near Liberty Lake, south of Interstate 90 and a mile west of Liberty Lake.

The Greenacres dump, near the hill now occupied by Country Vista Apartments, closed in the early 1970s.

In 1979, a drinking well downhill from the dump was contaminated by industrial solvents and heavy metals, according to newspaper accounts. The well did not draw from the Spokane Rathdrum Aquifer.

By the early 1980s, the Greenacres dump was among the first 500 landfills to be placed on the federal Superfund cleanup list.

6. Legacy Ridge was once a ski resort

In the 1970s, the large hill on the west side of the city, formerly known as Carlson Hill and now known as Legacy Ridge, was used as a ski and snowmobile recreation destination.

Holiday Hills, developed by Chuck Williams, offered a lodge and restaurant, one ski lift and three runs. Liberty Lake historian Ross Schneidmiller remembers the resort making snow for the runs, which still can be seen today marking the hillside, Schneidmiller said.

An RV park with an A-frame office also

offered camping in the summer, according to historical accounts.

Due to financial difficulties, Holiday Hills closed by the end of the decade.

Liberty Lake used to host hydroplane boat races

Racing boats on Liberty Lake started in the 1900s, said Schneidmiller, the Liberty Lake historian, but the hydroplane boat racing revved up in the 1940s off of Sandy Beach.

Some of the biggest names and boats in the sport raced across the waters at Liberty Lake at breakneck speeds.

"You could hear the roar of the hydros forever," Schneidmiller said. "There were some of us that loved it, let me tell you."

Schneidmiller remembers the racing coming to an end in the mid-1970s. Residents around the lake likely tired of the noise and bustle, he said.

8 Zephyr Lodge was rumored to be a brothel

Zephyr Lodge, now a Christian retreat center, started in the early 1900s when Charles Traeger constructed a lodge and casino on the east side of the lake adjacent to Liberty Lake County Park. Traeger spared no expense in decorating the two-story, 20-room inn, according to a 2004 article written by Keith Yates in "Nostalgia Magazine." Zephyr Lodge Casino, along with the dance hall, hotel and restaurant, did well. Yates wrote that music from the piano and vocalists could be heard at all hours across the lake.

Mary Floy Dolphin, whose family settled in the area around the same time, said her relatives told stories about people riding boats from the west side of the lake to Zephyr, since there were no roads to the lodge at the time.

"Liberty Lake was the place to go back in the day with its dance halls and merrygo-round," she said in an interview with The Splash for a 2009 article. "Zephyr Lodge was known as a speakeasy way back then and a house of ill repute."

9 Liberty Lake once was considered "Spokane's Inland Seashore"

Far from being private, Liberty Lake once had half a dozen resorts operating along its banks at one time and was considered "Spokane's Inland Seashore."

In the early 1900s, visitors could rent boats from the Liberty Lake Boat company, enjoy live band music and dancing at the pavilion, stay at resorts and enjoy all-Valley picnics. Silver City, on the site of the old Liberty Lake Park, offered a Ferris wheel, swing ride and a carousel with hand-carved wooden tigers, horses, frogs, cats and dogs. The carousel remained at the park until 1961. By 1951, according



to historical accounts, six resorts operated on Liberty Lake with four public beaches.

By the 1960s, however, many of the attractions had closed: the dance pavilion at the old Liberty Lake Park burned, the lake's water quality began to decline and by the 1970s, more resorts had closed and the Liberty Lake Park area was converted into a housing development.

In 1991, the last resort closed at Sandy Beach.

10 Country Vista Drive used to have a 45-mph speed limit

For newcomers to Liberty Lake, the 35-mph speed limit on Country Vista Drive west of Liberty Lake Road might not seem abnormal.

But less than two years ago, the road

that some residents have termed "the tarmac," stretching between Liberty Lake and Spokane Valley, sported a 45-mph speed limit. City officials changed that in 2008, citing the need for consistency and

safety, especially as development along the road continues to build.

Some residents were not pleased, complaining that the lower speed limit was unnecessary and inconvenient.

Survey Results

Nineteen readers responded to our online survey, "Community Report Card Revisited," that was on our Web site the past three weeks. The survey, a replica of a survey of the community taken just more than a decade ago, looks at seven quality of life/service areas in Liberty Lake. Survey responders were asked to assign a letter grade to various issues within each category. Following are the results:

1. WATER/SEWER ISSUES

Summary: Really nothing but high grades in this area, particularly in water quality (14 As), sewer service (12 As) and Liberty Lake Sewer and Water District Service (12 As). Stormwater runoff received the lowest grades, with almost as many Cs (8) as As (4) and Bs (5).

Comparison to 1999 survey: Virtually identical

Selected comment: "We are very lucky to have the (LLSWD) — one of the best in the state, one of the most affordable and taking care of the environment all around us ... the watersheds, lake and river."

2. TRANSPORTATION ISSUES

Summary: Sidewalks and trails and bike and pedestrian trails both scored big with 13 As. Freeway access and capacity was the worst graded in this category, receiving more Ds (6) than anything else. Survey comments referred to the lack of a traffic signal at the westbound off-ramp's intersection with Harvard and Mission as the main reason for low grades.

Comparison to 1999 survey: Anything related to trails received a C in 1999, revealing how far the trail system has come in the past 10 years. Another big stride forward was noted in safe traffic speeds, which received a D a decade

ago but received 11 As and Bs (against only 3 Ds and Fs) today. Mass transit received a slight upgrade to a B average from a C, but received more comments than anything else (see below).

Selected comments: "Would love to see light rail into Spokane in my lifetime" and "Need weekend and evening bus service to downtown."

3. PARKS AND OPEN SPACE

Summary: Friends of Pavillion Park and community activities received nothing but high grades (including 13 As), while residents expressed concern for the protection of both the watershed (7 Cs) and forest/open space (6 Ds).

Comparison to 1999 survey: Not a lot has changed in this category in 10 years, with the only difference being the aforementioned Pavillion Park/activities item bumping from a B to an A.

Selected comment: "We can always improve our protection of the natural beauty that surrounds us such as the lake and the open space. Friends of Pavillion Park have done a wonderful job in creating real meaningful community events."

4. UTILITY SERVICE

Summary: Every issue in this category received every grade in the book with the exception of snow removal, which received every grade but an F. The most common concerns were street repair and cable TV service, which both received 4 Ds and an F.

Comparison to 1999 survey: While the grades may have been all over the board, all were markedly better than a decade ago, when nothing averaged better than a D. Perhaps the biggest step forward came in snow removal, which went from an F average to more than half of respondents marking an A or B.

Selected comment: "Have you looked at the street between Safeway and Albertsons? What a mess! We have these beautiful brick planters indicating the Liberty Lake border, but generally newcomers get off the freeway and turn south, seeing this patchwork stretch of road and completely bypass the brick entrance. Oy vey!"

5. COMMUNITY SERVICES

Summary: Police (14 As), school (13 As) and fire (10 As) services received some of the best grades in the entire survey. With a C-plus average, animal control services was the worst graded in a very well-received category.

Comparison to 1999 survey: In a notable improvement of how they were viewed a decade ago, library facilities (from F to B), police (D to A) and medical/dental services (F to B) received favorable grades.

Selected comment: "We have a great

school at Liberty Lake but we need more of them. A new high school, a new middle school and a new elementary school would be a great asset to the community."

6. PLANNING/LAND USE

Summary: Half of the respondents gave Ds and Fs to the quality of planning and development in Liberty Lake. When asked the quality of specific types of developments, residential had a B average while both commercial and industrial landed solid Cs. The storefront vision that reduced street setbacks (see Walgreens) and erosion of hillside land were typical reasons given for lower grades.

Comparison to 1999 survey: If any category fared slightly worse today than a decade ago, it was this one. The quality of planning and development went from B averages to D averages, while everything else held fairly steady.

Selected comment: "Hodgepodge commercial development — why no "city center"? It's all about driving because it's so scattered."

7. GOVERNMENT REPRESENTA-TION

Summary: Most As? The fire district commissioners (5). Most Fs? Spokane County Commissioners (5). Most every other area of representation lived between Bs and Ds.

Comparison to 1999 survey: Transportation planning and the library board both left F territories for a B-minus average. Of course, the library board today is different than it was in 1999 for most of the community with the addition of the Liberty Lake Municipal Library.

Selected comment: "Too few city residents participate in city government. County residents, who want to participate, are over the line and left out."



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


